### **UPDATE ON INVESTMENTS**

## **Looking Back**

Last year will be remembered for the pivot in inflation that occurred. Money has shifted from being ultra-loose to tight. Inflation returned with a vengeance, influenced by COVID disruptions, pent-up demand, and the war in Ukraine. Interest rates shot up to levels we have not seen in well over a decade. This created challenging conditions for equity and bond markets alike, producing a rare simultaneous selloff for both asset classes, the likes of which we have not seen for over 40 years. In 2022, the S&P/TSX Index declined 5.8% and the S&P 500 and MSCI EAFE indices fell 12.3% and 8.3%, respectively while the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index fell 11.7%. In the 4th quarter, all three equity markets rose mid-single digits, and bonds were roughly flat. For reference, the Canadian Rugby Foundation consolidated portfolio return was a modest drop of 2.68%.

2022 reflected a more typical economic slowdown, with all areas of the economy being impacted, and our approach of owning solid companies with strong balance sheets and sensible valuations has worked, as we outperformed the down market by a wide margin.

## **Looking Ahead**

As we head into 2023, markets will remain firmly focused on inflation. US CPI has now shown two consecutive months of easing. Goods disinflation appears to be happening, led by declines in used car prices. Shelter inflation remains elevated but appears to be plateauing. With that said, there continues to be uncertainty around the time frame of getting inflation under control and labour market dynamics will be key. Hiring is still running at a pace of 260,000 jobs a month in the US and needs to be closer to 100,000 to reflect a more balanced labour market. It is likely we have turned the corner on inflation, but it will probably take some time to get back down to more normal levels. As a result, short-term interest rates will likely remain elevated for a period of time.

Given this backdrop, we feel good about how the portfolio is positioned. A more normal economic environment bodes well for stock pickers like our portfolio managers, as it weeds out the inevitable winners and losers. As distortions caused by the pronounced market intervention that we witnessed over the previous decade continue to work their way out of the system, fundamentals will return as the primary driver of portfolio results. These fundamentals are what our managers' investment process is all about – buying well-run, sensibly priced, profitable companies. – *Jim Kellett, Chair, Investment Committee* 



## **BYLAW CHANGES**

- Definition of Member revised to include a representative from each Fund with assets over \$100,000
- Number of Board members reduced from 18 to 15
- Directors can now serve for a maximum of three 3-year terms, other than Rugby Canada directors whose term ends concurrently with the end of their term on the Rugby Canada board.
- Nominations for election to the board will be made to achieve diversity, including gender, age, race, ethnicity, geographical location and socio-economic status.
- Status approved by the Board and Members and now pending filing with the CRA and Corporations Canada.

What a year it has been. Our Senior Women's National program had an amazing 2022 and the team's cohesiveness and desire were on full display during the Rugby World Cup in New Zealand. While disappointed in a fourth-place finish, they were the talk of the tournament for their grit and tenacity throughout.

As the sole amateur team among the world's top four teams, Canada's Women had great success in part due to the funding provided by the Monty Heald Fund which enabled added training days and supported team soft centralization. (Approximately \$100,000.)

Rugby Canada did also supply more funding this year than ever before, but with only so much capacity to draw from, this fund must continue to raise money to ensure a robust program for our women. - Stephanie White

## **U20 FUND**

### 2022 Overview:

Absolutely amazing to reconnect with the players in person. Fresh off of our resounding victory in Portugal (February 2020), the Canadian U20 Program was poised to take aim at the 2020 World Trophy Title. We had built a culture, in the years leading up to that point, of a team-first pursuit of excellence. We had professionalised the program with the generosity and commitment of the Canadian Rugby Foundation and the goodwill of the staff. We had a tour planned for early January 2022 but with the outbreak of Omicron we had to cancel the trip and yet again lose momentum.



We decided to put on a camp at Shawnigan Lake at the end of June to build into the summer series and try and get two local games for the team. As plans were being made the price of air travel throughout Canada skyrocketed. We again diverted plans in the name of money to an East and West Camp. It was not ideal but we made it work. The Camps themselves were a positive experience, We played the BC U19 team for the West and the Arrows Academy for the East. The Camps positive energy was nothing short of exceptional. From the moment we hit the ground running the boys were buzzing. The camps allowed us to select 28 Players for the Test Series in August.

The Test Series was held in Guelph, Ontario, and played host to Zimbabwe, Chile, and Uruguay. World Rugby was the host for all countries and paid for the flights, food, transportation and accommodation. With that being said we had to come in on August 9th and prepare for the first game on the 13th vs Zimbabwe. We really focused on the connection piece and brought in elders from the First Nations communities to welcome us to the traditional lands. It was extremely powerful and really helped shape our identity. We were able to reflect and continue to build our team culture around connecting to the land and each other through their wisdom. ## **U20 FUND**

The Canada U20 Men's program is very grateful for the continued support from the Canadian Rugby Foundation. Without their unwavering support of the program, we would not be able to be in the position that we are in. Further to that I believe strongly and want to ensure that the people involved in the program are recognized for their efforts, this program is strong because of the staff within it. The staff is the foundational piece of the program, and we are all here out of a pure passion for the game and the development of the next generation of rugby players within our country. I feel extremely lucky to be a part of such a group that can put the program first ahead of its own needs. As we continue to grow and evolve as an Under 20 Men's program, I hope we never lose sight of why we are doing this.



In 2022 the Canada men's U20 team participated in a World Rugby-sponsored tournament at U of Guelph in Ontario, involving Uruguay, Zimbabwe and Chile. This tournament was initiated and managed by Canada. Canada won one game and lost 2, despite having good players. However, they were inexperienced in international rugby and only had East and West camps as preparation.

This year (2023) there will 9 players returning from last year, the World Trophy will restart post -Covid in Kenya, and preparations are advanced with the Canadian players. A long list has been created, 46 players have been invited to a 4-day selection camp in February on Vancouver Island, a 2-game tour to Scotland or Uruguay is being planned in early May, with a preparation camp for a week in late May prior to the Trophy qualifiers. The games v the USA will be in the USA on June 3 and 7. If Canada qualifies for the World Trophy it will be in Kenya for the last 3 weeks of July.


The costs for this campaign will amount to about \$220,000 which will be borne by Rugby Canada, CRF, and the players in roughly equal proportions. This preparation would have been impossible to undertake without the donations made to the CRF legacy fund by multiple donors to support the 20th program. – Pat Parfrey



## PACIFIC PRIDE LEGACY FUND



Rugby Canada's Pacific Pride Academy program is gearing up for the 2022-23 season after its squad and schedule for the new campaign were confirmed.

Led by former international scrum half, Phil Mack, the Pacific Pride Academy is a national high-performance men's program aimed at preparing young, emerging Canadian players for professional rugby at the highest level. The program trains in a centralized environment, with players surrounded by like-minded, driven and dedicated rugby players who hope to develop their future careers in the sport.

"All of the players are really looking forward to the new season," commented Mack. "We have assembled a very strong roster which we believe can have a very successful campaign, starting against UBC this weekend. We have recruited heavily from the U19s Canadian Rugby Championships this year and have players representing almost every province. All of the players should be very proud of the selection for the Academy, but they will also be aware that the hard work starts now as the real action gets underway."

Given the Pacific Pride Academy falls within the Rugby Canada High-Performance umbrella, all players have the opportunity to be recognized by the national team program and coaching staff and, in turn, the chance at being selected for the Senior Men's 15s and 7s teams.

## Good Riddance to yet another COVID Year!

## **AURORA BARBARIANS FUND**

## Happy 70th



The Aurora Barbarians RFC (Barbs) celebrated their 70th anniversary this past summer. The Club began as two separate rugby clubs: The Toronto Barbarians and the Aurora Rugby Club. The club officially became the Aurora Barbarians in 2002 when the two clubs successful merged.

The Aurora Rugby Club was constituted in 1998, developing from the original Aurora Yorks which were formed in 1961 by John .T. P. Brown, a member of the Ontario Rugby Hall of Fame and a past president of the Ontario Rugby Union.

In 1949 rugby was resurrected in post-war Ontario by a group of British expatriates who banded together to form the Wanderers RFC. The following year, the group launched an intensive recruiting drive for players and drawing together a total of 80 would-be participants, set up three additional teams based in Toronto including the Barbarians

The club lead the development of junior rugby in the 70s and purchased a share of Fletcher's Fields during this time. The club were at the forefront of the re-development of Fletcher's Fields in the early 90's, which lead to the construction of a stadium which brought International rugby matches to the GTA.

On the pitch, the club fielded a number of strong championship Senior Men's and Youth teams in the 50's, 60's, 70's, and 80's. After the merger in 2002, the Aurora Barbarians enjoyed a string of success at the Senior Men's level. The club captured five straight league championships, three McCormick Club Championships and made at total of seven McCormick Cup appearances from 2006-2013.

The Senior Women were a similar dominant group with three OWL championships from 2012 to 2016. The club has also seen success from their U-18 Boys and Girls program having won numerous Provincial Championships

The Barbs have a strong Old Boy's network of "Black Sheep" supporters. There were notable tours in the 60's and 70's to USA and Caribbean destinations; in the 80's to Vancouver, California and Chicago; in the 90's and 2000's to Las Vegas and NY. These Black Sheep have been instrumental in setting up a new Aurora Barbarians Development Fund (article pending) in late 2022.

## SAINT JOHN TROJANS RFC FUND

Through their Foundation Endowment Fund, the Saint John Trojans have been able to fund the construction of a new clubhouse and community centre, which is now completing its final fundraising.





Supplementing the over \$100,000 in the Fund, the Federal government announced a \$275K investment through the Canada Community Revitalization that will allow the Trojans to construct the new community centre next to the rugby field and Hazen White-St. Francis School. The Trojans also received \$175K through the Regional Development Corporation of New Brunswick and \$50K through the City of Saint John.



"It's going to have changing facilities, but also we will have a community hall that can sit around 100 people, also we'll have a kitchen, and a lounge/recreational area" said Dave MacGowan, treasurer of the Saint John Trojans. Ground-breaking was in December 2022, and the building is expected to be completed in Summer 2023 in time for the club's 100<sup>th</sup>-anniversary reunion on November 3rd, 4th and 5th 2023 in Saint John, New Brunswick.

## **University Coaches Initiative**

We have a firm belief in the importance of university rugby in the development pathway for our national teams. This is already borne out with the success of the Women's 15s team, and our goal is to improve the calibre and depth of the men's university rugby talent pool. A key element of that is the ongoing development of our University Men's Rugby Coaches.

A virtual coaches clinic was held in Spring 2022 for Canadian university coaches, and was followed by a Summer tour of BC by Crusaders coach Shane Fletcher.

In May 2023, 10 university coaches from Canada (2 from BC organized by the BCRU and funded by the Foundation's Gerald McGavin Coaching Award Fund, and 8 from Canadian universities east of BC will attend a one-week camp at the Crusader facilities in Christchurch, NZ. The costs of the camp fees, room and board and travel are being subsidized by the Foundation's University Rugby Supporters Fund and Dave Lougheed's "For the Love of the Game" charity.

## **Newfoundland U18/U19 Tour of Wales**

As part of the Foundation's 2021-2022 Grassroots Rugby Assistance program, Rugby Newfoundland and the Swilers RFC received a grant that allowed a select U18/U19 team to tour Wales.

The tour was a big success in gaining Newfoundland players valuable competition and many were exposed to the rugby culture in the UK for the first time and it has made a positive impact on them.

The team travelled with 36 players and 5 coaches and had games in the Dragons region of Wales. The game results were:

- Bargoed RFC drew 19-19
- Whiteheads RFC lost 34-19
- Lantwtit Major RFC won 19-10
- Blackwood RFC lost 32-29.

As well as games, we practiced daily, did full video sessions of games, and watched the Dragons vs. Cardiff URC game.
